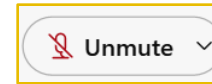

Timeline to COP-7



15 December 2026: Parties to notify the Secretariat of offers to host regional preparatory meetings by 15 December 2026; Specific dates for regional meetings to be held June-July 2027 will be announced at a later stage.

6 January 2027: Parties that intend to propose an amendment to the Convention including its annexes in accordance with Articles 26 and 27 of the Convention are invited to submit to the Secretariat the text of any proposed amendment by 6 January 2027 (8 months before COP-7, and 2 months before the deadline for communication to all Parties established in Article 26).

5 March 2027: the Secretariat will distribute the invitation letter along with the provisional agenda for COP-7 .

6 March 2027: offers to host COP-8 to reach the Secretariat

6 March 2027: text of any proposed amendments to the Convention and its annexes to be communicated to Parties

6 March and July 2027: In accordance with decision MC-6/6, Parties that intend to request an extension of an exemption in accordance with paragraph 6 of Article 6 of the Convention should submit such request to the Secretariat preferably at least six months (6 March 2027), but no less than two months, before COP-7 (6 July 2027).

23 March 2027: entry into force of COP-6 amendments to Annex A.

May-August 2027: COP-7 registration period

8 June 2027 : In accordance with Article 31 of the Convention, a country shall deposit its instruments of ratification, acceptance, approval or accession with the depositary at least 90 days before the beginning of COP-7 - by 8 June 2027 - to be considered a Party at COP-7.

8 June 2027: The Secretariat will make available on the Convention's website the Programme of Work and Budget document in all languages 90 days before COP-7.

Mid-June to mid-July 2027: timeframe for regional preparatory meetings

12 July 2027: In accordance with decision MC-6/22, all other working documents will be made available in all languages 8 weeks before COP-7.

Offers for hosting COP-8

- The meetings of the COP shall take place **at the seat of the Secretariat, unless the COP decides otherwise**
- Governments hosting a meeting of the COP outside the seat of the Secretariat would **bear the actual additional direct and indirect costs** of holding the meeting outside the seat of the Secretariat.
- Parties interested in hosting future meetings are advised to consult the Secretariat, which will be ready to provide initial **estimates**.
- COP-8 is expected to be presided by **Africa**.
- Expressions of interest to host COP-8 shall be submitted to the Secretariat preferably six months before COP-7 (**6 March 2027**).
- The Secretariat has made a tentative booking of conference facilities in Geneva for COP-8 from **5 to 9 November 2029**.

- In accordance with paras. 3(a) and 4 of Article 27, additional annexes as well as amendments to annexes shall be **proposed and adopted** according to the procedure laid down in paragraphs 1–3 of Article 26.
- Pursuant to Article 4(7) and Article 5(9), proposals for listing a mercury-added product in Annex A or manufacturing processes using mercury or mercury compounds in Annex B shall include information related to the availability, technical and economic feasibility and environmental and health risks and benefits of the non-mercury alternatives.
- Pursuant to Article 26(2), amendment proposals are to be communicated to Parties at least six months before the COP meeting (**6 March 2027** for COP-7).

Article 26

Amendments to the Convention

1. Amendments to this Convention may be proposed by any Party.
2. Amendments to this Convention shall be adopted at a meeting of the Conference of the Parties. The text of any proposed amendment shall be communicated to the Parties by the Secretariat at least six months before the meeting at which it is proposed for adoption. The Secretariat shall also communicate the proposed amendment to the signatories to this Convention and, for information, to the Depositary.
3. The Parties shall make every effort to reach agreement on any proposed amendment to this Convention by consensus. If all efforts at consensus have been exhausted, and no agreement reached, the amendment shall as a last resort be adopted by a three-fourths majority vote of the Parties present and voting at the meeting.

Article 27

Adoption and amendment of annexes

1. Annexes to this Convention shall form an integral part thereof and, unless expressly provided otherwise, a reference to this Convention constitutes at the same time a reference to any annexes thereto.
2. Any additional annexes adopted after the entry into force of this Convention shall be restricted to procedural, scientific, technical or administrative matters.
3. The following procedure shall apply to the proposal, adoption and entry into force of additional annexes to this Convention:
 - (a) Additional annexes shall be proposed and adopted according to the procedure laid down in paragraphs 1–3 of Article 26;
4. The proposal, adoption and entry into force of amendments to annexes to this Convention shall be subject to the same procedures as for the proposal, adoption and entry into force of additional annexes to the

Entry into force of amendments

Amendments to the text of the Convention (Art. 26(5)): 90 days after the date of deposit of instruments of ratification, acceptance or approval by at least **three-fourths of the Parties** that were Parties at the time at which the amendment was adopted. Thereafter, the amendment shall enter into force for any other Party on the ninetieth day after the date on which that Party deposits its instrument of ratification, acceptance or approval of the amendment.

Additional annexes and amendments to existing annexes:

- one year from the date of the communication by the Depositary of the adoption;
- notification of non-acceptance within one year from the date of communication by the Depositary.

In accordance with Article 26(4), in case of amendments to existing annexes, 90 days after the deposit with the Depositary of the instrument of ratification, acceptance, approval or accession for Parties that made a **declaration under Article 30(5)**.

In accordance with Article 26(5), if an additional annex or an amendment to an annex is related to an amendment to this Convention, the additional annex or amendment shall not enter into force until such time as the amendment to the Convention enters into force.

Intersessional work and Submissions for COP-7

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The Conference of the Parties held its **sixth meeting** from 3 to 7 November 2025 in Geneva, Switzerland, and agreed on several action items. The Executive Secretary **sent a letter** to Parties and observers on 9 February 2026 to **call for information** to follow up on these action items.

Mercury supply sources and trade

The COP adopted **decision MC-6/1** inviting Parties that reported on experiences and challenges faced in the implementation of paragraph 3 of Article 3, on **primary mercury mining** in their national reports under Article 21 to provide further information to the Secretariat with a view to its being shared with the Implementation and Compliance Committee for further consideration.

Furthermore, Parties, including those benefiting from ongoing projects of the GEF, are encouraged to continue to share information with the Secretariat about experiences in preventing and combating illegal trade in mercury, including with respect to the use of

Supply sources and trade (Article 3)

In response to [decision MC-6/1](#), the Secretariat is preparing a **call for information** for Parties to share:

- experiences (in particular from Parties benefiting from GEF funding) in preventing and combating **illegal trade in mercury**, including with respect to the **use of forms** related to Article 3 on mercury trade;
- **lessons learnt** for addressing the supply and trade of mercury for Parties not in compliance with Article 3. The information will be utilized in the development of a **report** on the issue to be considered by COP-7.

In the preparation of the report the Secretariat will **collaborate** with organizations with expertise on illegal trade, such as the United Nations Office on Drugs and Crime (**UNODC**), the International Criminal Police Organization (**INTERPOL**), and World Customs Organization (**WCO**).



- Decision [MC/6/2](#) invited Parties and stakeholders to submit, **by 31 March 2026**, available information on the supply, use and trade of **mercury compounds**, as well as views and input on **mercury compounds which could possibly be subject to trade control measures** under Article 3.
- Submissions were received from 10 Parties and 3 observers, which have been posted on the Convention [website](#).
- Pursuant to the same decision, an **open-ended expert group** was established through nominations from Parties and stakeholders. The group met online on 4 June 2026, and elected Daniel Delcarpio (Canada) and Pathé Dieye (Senegal) as co-chairs.
- The group is to submit recommendations to the Secretariat **no later than 8 months before COP-7 (6 January 2027)**.

Trade of mercury compounds

The COP, in [decision MC-6/2](#), encouraged Parties and stakeholders to reflect on the information contained in the report on the global supply, production, trade and use of mercury compounds ([UNEP/MC/COP.6/5/Add.1](#) and [UNEP/MC/COP.6/INF/5](#)), and to consider the need for an additional annex that would make mercury compounds subject to the trade provisions of paragraphs 6 and 8 of article 3.

Parties and stakeholders are invited to submit on a voluntary basis, by 31 March 2026, available information on the supply, use and trade of mercury compounds, and to share their views and input on possible mercury compounds which could be listed in a proposed annex. Submission should be sent to the Secretariat by email.

The COP also decided to establish an **open-ended expert group** with a mandate to consider the information in the report on the global supply, production, trade and use of mercury compounds and the information submitted as mentioned above, working in English in an online setting. National Focal Points may wish to nominate one or more experts, attaching a curriculum vitae. Observers to the COP may also wish to nominate experts. Nominations are to be sent to the Secretariat by email. Online meetings will be convened after March 2026.

- COP-6, in decision MC-6/3, amended Annex A to the convention to:
 - ✓ Established the **phase-out date of 2034** for manufacturing, import and export of dental amalgam
 - ✓ Required Parties that have not phased out to take measures to not allow or significantly phase down dental amalgam.
- The COP-6 amendments were [communicated](#) by the Depositary to the Parties on 23 March 2026, and **enter into force on 23 March 2027**, as explained in the Secretariat's [letter](#) on 27 March 2026.
- Decision [MC-6/13](#):
 - ✓ Invites Parties to submit, as provided for in COP-5 amendment to Annex A Part II, their completed **national action plans** on the phase-out of dental amalgam either by 31 December 2025 (2nd full national reports) by 31 December 2027 (3rd short national reports)
 - ✓ Requested the Secretariat to prepare **draft guidance** on developing national action plans to phase out dental amalgam.
- With the financial support from the **European Union**, the Secretariat will develop draft guidance, using the opportunities of meetings under [GEF Project #10936](#).



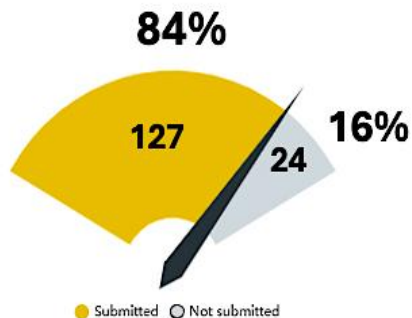
- Decision [MC-6/4](#) encouraged **Parties without national legislation or other measures**, or otherwise **facing challenges in implementing their obligations** regarding mercury-added cosmetics, to **inform the Secretariat** and to consider the application of **Article 14 and/or 15** to their situation.
- The Secretariat issued a [letter](#) on 22 May 2026 to invite Parties and stakeholders to submit information by **30 June 2026**, noting that the following information will also be taken into account:
 - ✓ [National reports](#) pursuant to Article 21
 - ✓ [Submissions](#) for the intersessional work for COP-6 pursuant to decision MC-5/5
 - ✓ WHO database of regulatory approaches
 - ✓ Information from relevant meetings, including the [GEF Project Stakeholders Group meeting](#) on 15 June 2026.
- With the financial support from the **European Union**, the Secretariat will develop COP-7 documents also including other elements of the intersessional work, such as cooperation with INTERPOL and WCO on the investigation of the sources of mercury-added cosmetics, mechanisms for supporting enforcement and identification of such cosmetics, lessons learned from [GEF project #10810](#).



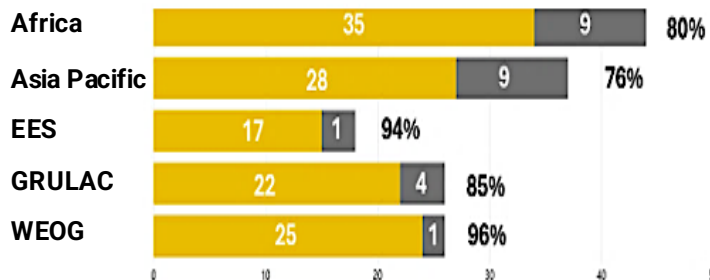
National reporting

- COP in decision 6/13 encouraged Parties to maintain the **high reporting rate** pursuant to Article 21 of the Convention.
- 127 parties (84%) have submitted reports for 2021-2024.
- **The remaining Parties are encouraged to submit their national report as soon as possible.**
- The results of the national reporting will be utilized by the Effectiveness Evaluation Group and Implementation and Compliance Committee, as well as presented to COP-7.

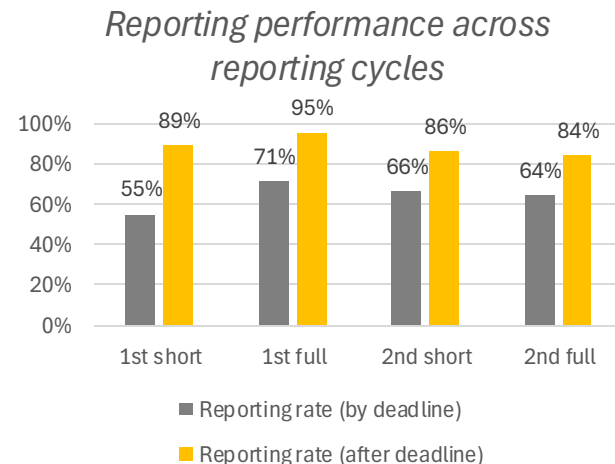

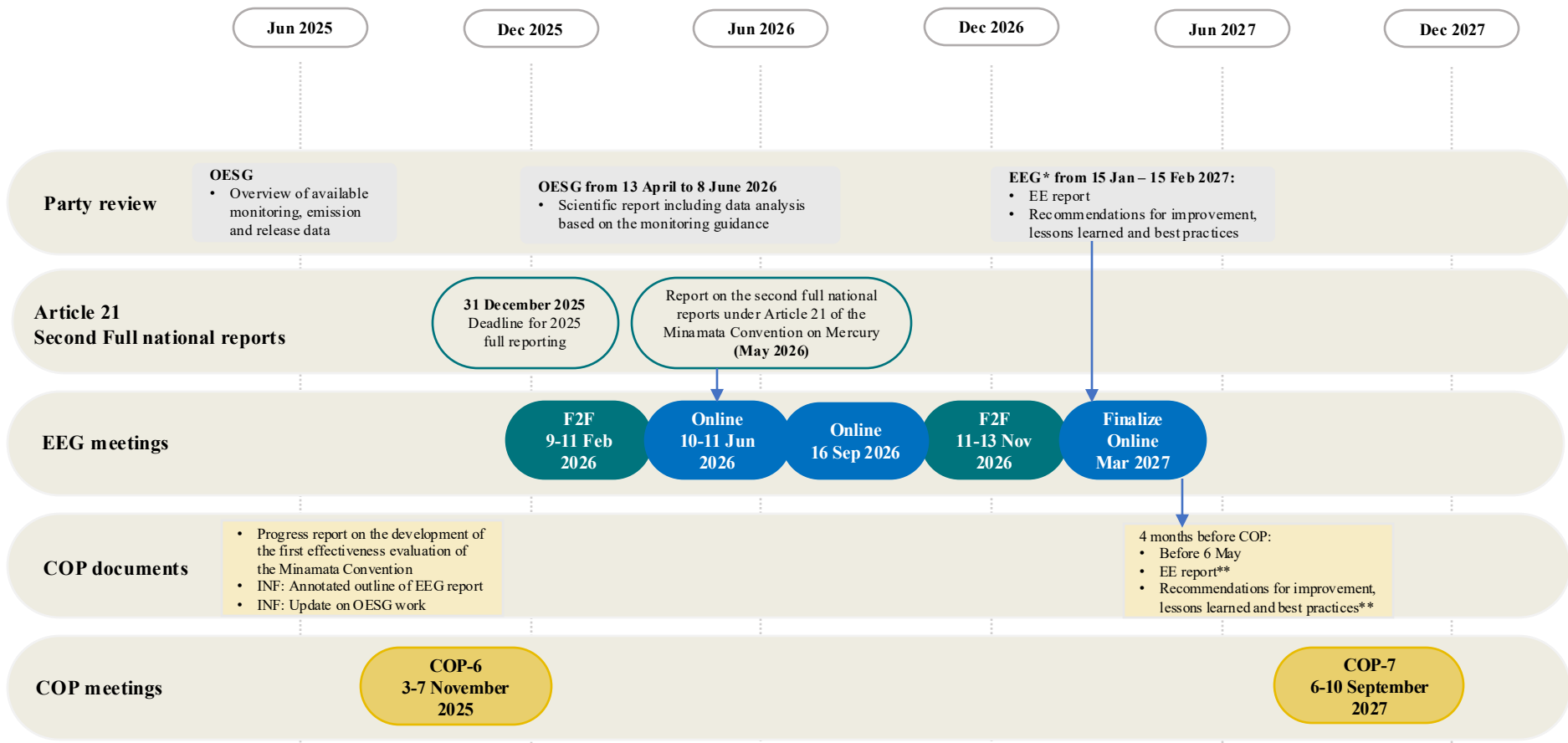

UPDATES ON SPECIAL TRUST FUND

Fundraising status to the Special Trust Fund 2026-2027 biennium



✓ **Switzerland**

- 400K CHF contribution on annual basis (800K CHF in the biennium) as host country, securing funding for one delegate per eligible county in COP-7 and its regional meetings;
- 112K USD credit/reimbursement for the COP-6 venue (CICG).

✓ **Japan**

- 400K USD, on annual basis, to support scientific activities under the Minamata Convention.

✓ **The European Union**

- 617K USD to support intersessional work (e.g. cosmetics, dental amalgam, Article 3, ASGM, scientific cooperation and implementation efficiency, Minamata Convention exchange platform).

✓ **Spain**

- 28K USD for activities addressing health concerns of women and children, and the effective participation of Indigenous Peoples and local communities.

✓ **Germany**

- 27K USD for negotiation and co-chairs training.

Funding needs - 2026-2027 biennium

The letter from the Secretariat dated 20 May presents updates on voluntary contributions, including further funding needs:

- Funding of a Junior Professional Officer position to assist with the activities of the Specific International Programme.
- Funding of a Junior Professional Officer position to support science-policy collaboration.

SIP: The Specific International Programme to support Capacity-building and Technical Assistance

- **4 rounds of applications** to the SIP launched to date.
- **34 projects approved** by the SIP Governing Board in 31 countries.
- The **number of applications has increased** with each round.
- Over **8.4 million USD contributed to the fund** since its establishment.
- **Initial term** of the SIP **ends in 2027**, potential extension up to 7 years to be considered at COP-7.

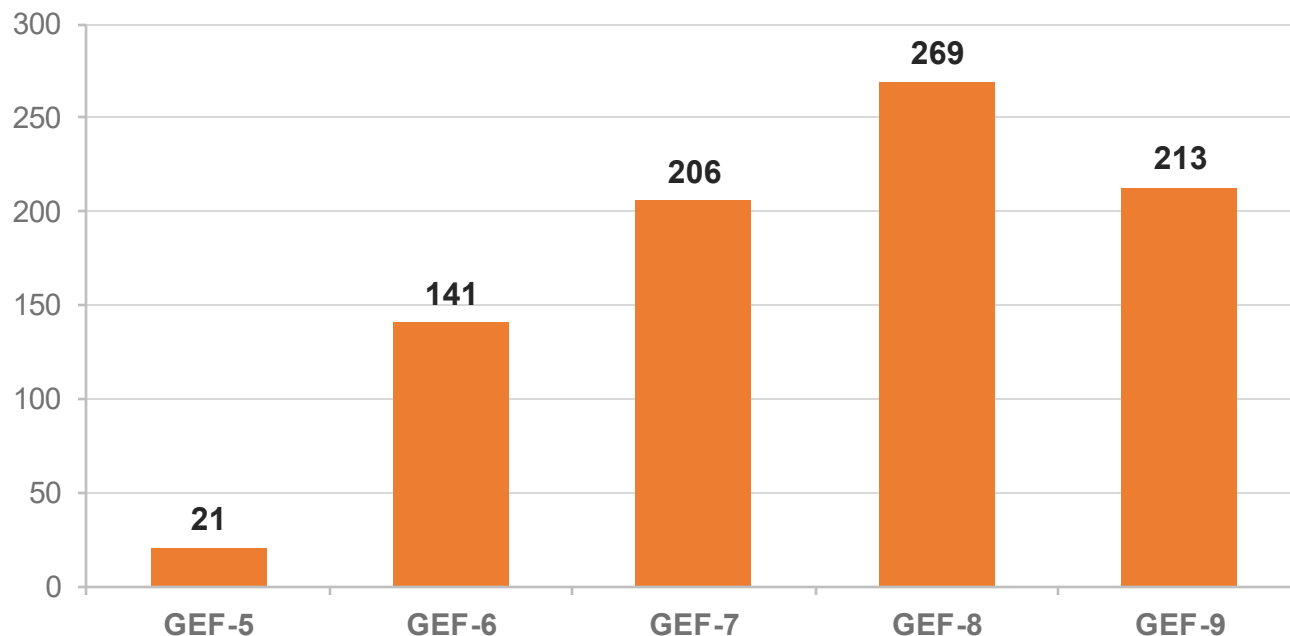

GEF-5 through GEF-9 (millions USD)**

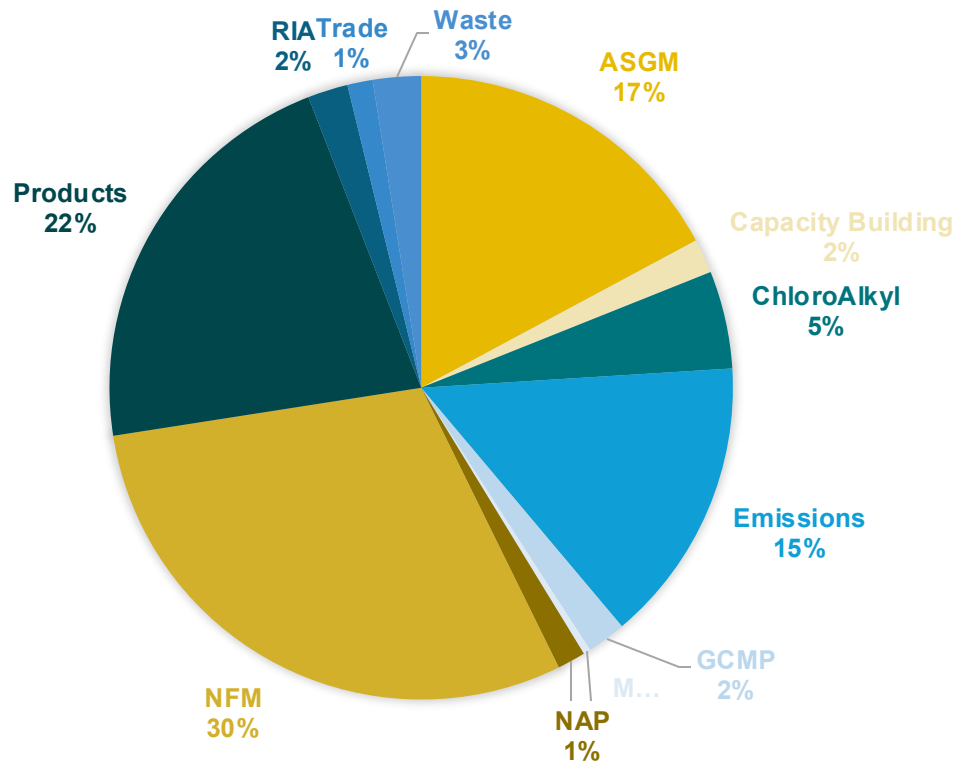

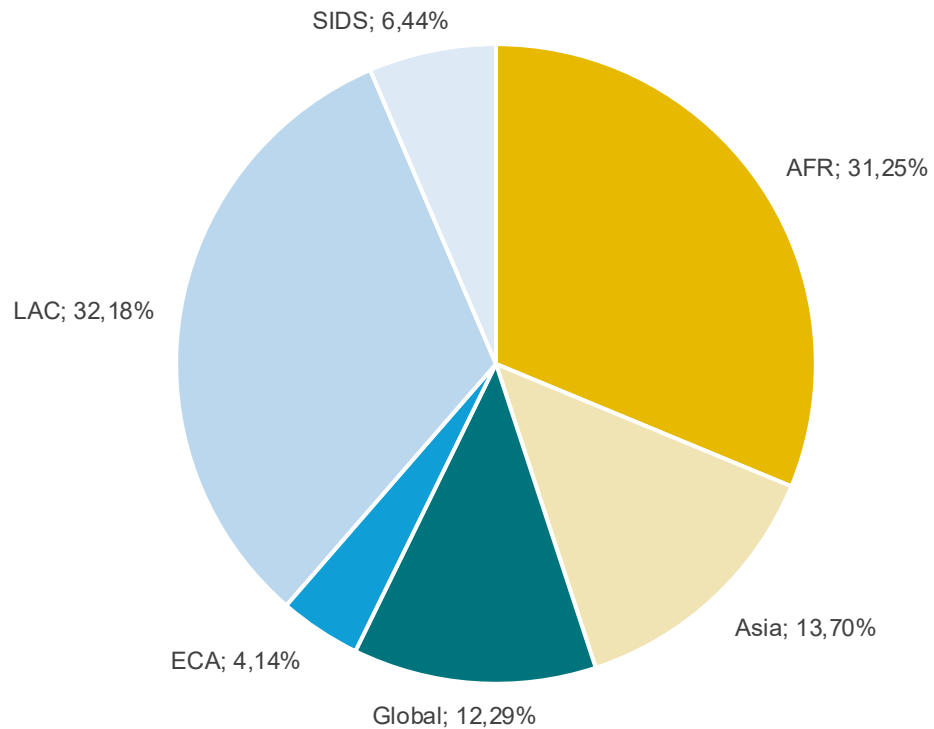
